American Bubba Watson claimed his second green jacket in three years with a three-shot Masters win at Augusta National Golf Club.


Goss was assured the prestigious award after being the only amateur to make the halfway cut in the year's first Major and in the process becomes the first Australian to win the title. John Senden finished the best of the Aussies in a tie for 8th, while Scott closed out with a 72 to finish in a tie for 14th at 1-over-par, nine shots behind Watson.

Back home another talented young gun was making news with Ryan Ruffels winning the Australian Junior championship for his second National Trial event title from two starts. Last month the 15-year-old became the youngest player in its 106-year history to win the Riversdale Cup.

BUBBA RUNS AWAY WITH SECOND US MASTERS TITLE

American Bubba Watson has claimed his second green jacket in three years with a three-shot Masters win at Augusta National Golf Club.

Watson backed up his 2012 playoff triumph posting a three-under 69 final round and an eight-under-par total to finish three clear of 20year-old Jordan Spieth and Swede Jonas Blixt, who tied for second at five-under.

Spain's Miguel Angel Jimenez, at 50-years-old, claimed fourth place at four-under with Americans Matt Kuchar and Rickie Fowler tied for fifth a shot further back.

"Walking up 18 was a little bit easier this time," said Watson, who beat Louis Oosthuizen in a play-off two years ago.

"This one is a lot different. The first one I kind of lucked into it, but this is a lot of hard work. After giving it back I wanted to get it back again."

Watson put on a sensational display of driving, each time he gambled with his lead, but it paid off giving him flexibility with short iron approaches to the ever slick Augusta greens.

"Eight and nine were really the turning point where the momentum kind of went my way," said Watson.

"It's a dream to win and winning the green jacket is a really big deal."

Watson joins an illustrious list of previous winners who have won the Masters more than once, including Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Tiger Woods, Tom Watson, Sam Snead, Gary Player, Ben Hogan and Seve Ballesteros.

Spieth emerges from this tournament with immense credit to his name. The 20-year-old Texan was seeking to become the youngest ever winner of the Masters in just his third appearance at a major.

Instead, Spieth fell narrowly short but displayed a gritty spirit and maturity in defeat as he simply refused to give up. He proved both to himself and others that he can go toe-to-toe with the best at a major and it is just a matter of time before Spieth wins in these bigger events. John Senden was the best of the Aussies finishing an even par and in a tie for 8th position. Senden has guaranteed a return to the Masters in 2015 by finishing inside the top-12, along with last year's champion Adam Scott who has a lifetime exemption through his victory. Scott's final day 72 left him one-over and tied for 14th in his title defence with Jason Day finishing in a tie for 20th at two-over. "Well, I've enjoyed the week thoroughly. I mean it's been a week I'll never forget, the experiences I've had in playing a tournament as the defending champion and as a champion, and all the ovations that you receive around here is amazing memories for me," said Scott.

"I think as far as my game goes I was really happy with where I put myself on Friday night. And without over analysing it it's always a bit here or there, but a poor nine holes on Saturday stopped all my momentum and had me on the back foot and I just couldn't go anywhere from there."

Steven Bowditch closed at four-over in his debut Masters and Oliver Goss finished off his Silver Cup-winning run as leading amateur at 10-over par with a final round 75.

"You know, there's certain points in your career, certain tournaments that do change your game, and I think this is one of them. This is the pinnacle of golf," said Goss.

NOTHING ELEMENTARY ABOUT THIS WATSON

Bubba Watson is in rare air now. Its one thing to win a Green Jacket, but two in three years... that's incredible!

The scary thing is, he looks like he is going to win a few more. If that happens he'll be in the company of Masters legends Jack, Arnie and Tiger.

It's not *that* he won this week at Augusta National it's **how** he did it. I called three of his four rounds on Featured Group 2 for CBS on their digital platform and the potency of his driver is mind-boggling. He barely missed a fairway.

In 1997, Tiger Woods humbled the famed tournament layout, hitting many short irons into par 5s which prompted the membership to make changes to the course.

It's had the adverse affect, minimising the number of players who can actually win. Only brutal weather conditions allowed shorter hitters like Mike Weir, Zach Johnson and Trevor Immelman to slip into a Green Jacket since the changes.

However, when the weather is good, like it was this past week, it plays right into the bombers hands. Think Cabrera, Mickelson and Scott. Bubba though is on another level.

His ability to hit the ball astonishing lengths while shaping it both ways gives him a weapon no other player possesses.

Over those three rounds he hit clubs into greens most will only dream of. His drive on 13 in the final round was farcical.

With firm and fast greens that have all sorts of undulations, he's hitting wedges or short irons with plenty of sideways spin.

It takes away the defence of the course, the need for precision on the second shot. Even a moderate display on or around the greens is enough to get the job done.

The other weapon Watson has is he's lefthanded. It took 67 years for a lefty to win at Augusta, but in the last 12 Masters since - Weir, Mickelson and Watson have combined for six Green Jackets. Why? I'll leave it to Scott McCarron my co-commentator this week to describe.

"Augusta National favours a right to left ball flight, for a left-hander that's a fade. A fade allows the ball to stop quicker on these greens and when Bubba is hitting it the lengths he does, there's no one who can compete with him."

20-year-old young gun Jordan Spieth did a pretty good job trying to, but in the end he was left fighting himself. And while we were robbed of the thrills that come on the back nine on Sunday, you simply have to admire Bubba's ball striking display – there's nothing elementary about this Watson.


Unfortunately, Australia didn't get to celebrate back-to-back Green Jackets, but we did have two of our seven strong contingent in Butler Cabin on Sunday and that should be applauded.

Adam Scott was a statesman throughout his year as Masters Champion, there's not one person he didn't impress. Also congratulations to Oliver Goss for claiming low amateur honours.

John Senden deserves a special mention as well for his best Masters performance - tied 8th. Australian golf is in strong shape, the turning point was this time last year... may it long continue.



GOSS CREATES HISTORY AS FIRST AUSSIE LOW AMATEUR **BY BERNIE MCGUIRE**

Fremantle's Oliver Goss officially created Masters history when presented by Augusta Chairman, Billy Payne with the 'Low Amateur' award at the 2014 Masters.

Goss was assured the prestigious award after being left the only non-professional to make the halfway cut in the year's first Major.

The Surrey-born Australian, who celebrated his 20th birthday on Saturday, was afforded a Masters invitation on the back of finishing runner-up to Sheffield's Matthew Fitzpatrick in last year's US Open.

But while Fitzpatrick missed the cut, Goss had a double celebration with patrons around the 18th green signing 'Happy Birthday' when he ended his third round ahead of the applause in receiving his award.

"I can't believe it, to be honest with you as I heard that I might be the second Australian, but to be the first is really quite unbelievable," he said.

Goss, proudly wearing his Golf Australia cap and shirt, posted a final round 75 to share 49th place among the 51 players to have made the cut.

But the Tennessee University student could not be bothered where he finished as he tried to fathom his accomplishment, a year after Adam Scott became the first Australian-born winner of the Masters.

"I've had some great experiences this week and you really can't pick out one or two things," he said.

"It's kind of the overall thing. I've just got to step back now and have a look at the entire week and just learn as much as I can from the whole week."

And while thrilled with his efforts Goss was also physically and mentally drained having played the course each day since arriving last week.

"I've been here for exactly ten days, and I'm absolutely exhausted," he said.

"You've got to play your best golf every single day, it just amazes me. And I can definitely tell I'm going to get back home and hit the cardio a little harder. I really respect these guys for what they do."

Waiting for Goss was his parents, who had moved from Surrey in England to Western Australia just prior to Oliver's sixth birthday. Also anxious to embrace Goss was his girlfriend, Jessie who has been instrumental in arranging a

birthday cake for him.

"It's just good to see my whole family out here and I'm thrilled they could all share this with me," he said

"Probably the last six birthdays I've always spent it on the road playing. And I think it's something I got used to, kind of, through my teenage years. But this has been the best birthday."

Goss will return to his university studies and also look forward to June's US Open at Pinehurst No. 2, but with no talk yet when he might turn professional.

MATT JONES: LAST IN, IN NO HURRY TO LEAVE

Matt Jones didn't get much of a chance to bask in the glory of his miraculous victory at last week's Houston Open.

Jones had to turn travel planner no sooner after he had he collected his first PGA Tour winner's trophy by defeating Matt Kuchar with an outrageous chip-in birdie on the first playoff hole, which was not long after his equally outrageous 46-foot birdie putt on the final green which gave him a chance at making the playoff.

With the win, the Sydneysider had earned the last available spot in The Masters field and Jones had to move a light speed to make plans for the week not only for his wife and daughters, but tickets for his coach, family and friends in Australia and Arizona.

With such a limited preparation if you could even call it that, it was hardly surprising that Jones went on to miss the cut after rounds of 74 - 78 to finish at +8, four strokes outside the cut line.

"It was tough. You can't be off anywhere; I putted horrendously and didn't hit it well enough from the fairways into the greens." said Jones, who played in Wednesday's Par 3 Contest and had the thrill of making a hole-inone at the 3rd with his family in tow as caddies.

The saving grace of missing the weekend was that he now had time to exhale a little and spend time celebrating at the Augusta National with those closest to him.

"Everyone is here," he said."It's been busy, and now I can enjoy being here with everyone. I'm going to come out and enjoy being here and have a couple of beers with friends and family."

Jones' Houston win has vaulted him inside the all-important Top 50 in the world ranking which positions him well for starts in more of the bigger events and major championships later in the year.

And of course, there's always next year's Masters where he hopes to return with a little more than a moment's notice next time. Not that he's complaining.

AUSSIES DO US PROUD AGAIN ATAUGUSTA NATIONAL

When Adam Scott won The Masters in April 2013 he achieved more than the glory of a maiden Major championship, the \$1.4million in prize money and the honour of becoming the first Australian to wear the coveted Green Jacket.

The moment he rolled in that birdie putt at the second playoff hole, Scott elevated the profile of Australian golf to a level not experienced since the glory days of Greg Norman. The knock-on effect has and continues to be massive.

After Matt Jones made it four wins in seven weeks by Australians on the PGA Tour a fortnight ago in Texas, the Aussies were primed for success heading to Augusta.

Scott was defending champion and we had experienced victory on the PGA Tour this season more than any other nation, giving us all confidence something special might again happen at Augusta.

But it would not go to script with the Augusta greens, considered the most challenging of any major, playing their part in dashing our player's hopes for success.

Scott was the highest-profile victim of the Augusta greens no more so than during his final Sunday round.

The defending champion tumbled from third to 16th courtesy of a front-nine 40 that all but ended his title defence as he slipped to one over and six shots out of the lead shared by American pair Jordan Spieth and Bubba Watson.

Scott closed out with a 72 to finish in a tie for 14th at 1-over-par, nine shots behind Watson.

"I'm striking it well enough, but it was so difficult to get the ball close to the hole to give yourself realistic birdie putts and I didn't take advantage of the par fives again and that might be the killer for me this week," Scott said.

John Senden was the best of the Aussies finishing at even par and in a share of 8th position, booking his return back to Augusta with his top-10 result and in the process recognising the enormity of the challenge with winning at the Masters.

Jason Day finished off his fourth Masters appearance in solid style for 20th place finish, but with limited opportunity for practice, he knew he was under prepared coming into the tournament.

"Obviously it's frustrating for me to not be able to kind of have some more competitive rounds under my belt before Augusta," said Day, referring to his time off from a thumb injury.

Steven Bowditch rode on his wave of success from Texas finishing in a tie for 26th in his first appearance at the Masters, which in itself is a credit to the Queenslander.

Oliver Goss was the only one of six amateurs who started the Masters to play at the weekend, his second round 71 seeing him as the first Australian to claim low amateur at the Masters. Matt Jones was another casualty after a second round 78 saw him at 8-over and missing the

weekend.



RYAN RUFFELS: THE NEXT WAVE

Ryan Ruffels has two more seasons remaining in the junior ranks but the 15-year-old has his sights set higher.

This season Ruffels plans to compete on the US amateur circuit starting July with the North & South Amateur at Pinehurst, the first of a scheduled five US events for him including the US Junior and hopefully the US Amateur.

Last month Ruffels became the youngest player in its 106-year history to win the Riversdale Cup. Over the closing stages he held his nerve and composure for a one shot victory over Todd Sinnott and his first National Trial event title and in the process proved that he can compete at the elite amateur level.

In hindsight, there was little doubt Ruffels could compete at the elite amateur level.

You only have to look at Ruffels' recent results which include two victories and seven top-10 finishes since Mandurah last year. Ruffels' consistency has been nothing short of impressive.

Back in January he became arguably the most dangerous 64th seed to be playing the Australian Amateur and he showed why, accounting for top-seed, Englishman Ryan Evans, 3&2, in the opening round before Ruffels' run ended in the 3rd round.

Ruffels' R&A world ranking moved inside the top-60 after Riversdale, seeing him just outside the top-50 that get automatic entry to the US Amateur. More importantly, Ruffels finished these events with the belief that his game is ready to tackle the international amateur stage.

"It started off at the Federal Amateur last year," said Ruffels, who finished runner-up in that event. "Since then my confidence and game has continued to

improve."

"Making the cut at the Australian Open was another confidence booster. I'm starting to know my way around golf courses better and are learning how to compete week-in-week-out. More importantly, I'm learning how to play 'smart golf'."

Ruffels, like many of our talented prospects, is riding on the wave of Aussie success our players are achieving, both on the amateur stage and with our four wins so far this year on the PGA Tour.

"It's cool being part of Australian golf at the moment," he says.

"Gossy's success at Augusta was amazing. He's the benchmark amateur player at present with his result at last year's US Amateur and what he's achieving in the US."

"We all look up to Adam Scott and Jason Day and what they're achieving. It's just a cool time for Australian golf and to be part of it motivates you to compete and win."

Last Friday on a rain soaked Heritage Golf and Country Club layout Ruffels added another significant title to his credit - the Australian Junior championship for his second major amateur win from two starts.

In the process he booked a start at this year's Australian Open and his name will be inscribed next to previous Junior champions including Adam Scott and Jason Day.

"For me the first two rounds, I just kept the ball in front of me."

"The fairways are nice and wide so you've just got to be able to hit the fairways and with the greens this soft, you're able to get aggressive with the second shot."

"I was able to hit it close enough to take a bit of stress off the putting and ended up playing pretty stress-free golf for most the four rounds which was great."

The 15 year-old's exemption into the Emirates Australian Open in November will be his second consecutive appearance.

Ruffels continued on his recent good form which included victory at the recent Riversdale Cup in Melbourne.

The Boys' Interstate Teams Matches will be played from 13-16 April will all Australian states and territories represented.

Victorian junior Konomi Matsumoto held on to win the Australian Girls' Amateur Championship in steady rain by one stroke at Yering Meadows Golf Club in Victoria's Yarra Valley.

"It's great - I was really nervous in the morning (third) round and again this afternoon," Matsumoto said.

"I've been practising so hard for this - I was hoping for at least a top 3 finish and after my first round, it gave me a lot of confidence."

"It means so much. I learnt so much...mainly you have to keep playing your game. You can have one bad hole but you can't give up."

Matsumoto competed at this year's ISPS HANDA Women's Australian Open at Victoria Golf Club via invitation and will return for 2015 championship with full exemption, courtesy of this win.

The Girls' Interstate Teams' Matches will be played from 13-15 April at the same venue with New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia and Victoria contesting the event.



NSW's Nathan Green failed to capitalise on his share of the overnight lead, shooting a two-over 74 as Carlos Ortiz became the first Mexicanborn player to win the El Bosque Mexico Championship on Sunday.

Ortiz broke out of his tie with Green with four birdies on his front nine at El Bosque Country Club and held a three-stroke lead before late bogies on 16 and 17 cut his lead to just one with the par-five 18th still to play.

However, Ortiz reached the green in two and calmly two-putted for a final round four-under 68 and a 13-under total to claim a two-stroke victory over American Justin Thomas. Green's three bogies on the back nine dropped him into a six-way tie for 3rd at seven-under.

"I was pretty shaky at the end," Ortiz said. "But I managed to hit it on the green in two at 18. After that, I knew I had it."

"It's an honour to win here in Mexico. It makes everyone so happy around here. I don't have the words, it just feels great."

Ortiz now has two victories in the current Web.Com Tour season and moves to the top of the Money List with \$304,458. He is just one win shy of an immediate 'Battlefield Promotion' to the PGA Tour last achieved by Australian Michael Sim, when he won three times in the 2009 season.

Green's best finish on the Web.Com Tour since the 2005 Jacob's Creek Open moves him to No. 39 on the money list while Cameron Percy (T9th) also placed highly with Nick Flanagan and Nick O'Hern the remaining Australians to make the

Still Masters chairman Billy Payne revealed Woods had to be immobilised for two weeks after his back surgery to relieve a pinched nerve.

And while speculation persists that he may be out of action for at least three months, Woods has made a habit of defying the critics over the years and finding his best golf form.

And he doesn't like missing dinner either.

Woods had been at every Champions Dinner since winning the first of his four green jackets in 1997.

Woods' agent, Mark Steinberg, is reported to have told Payne Woods had to be "very still" for at least a couple of weeks.


That effectively ruled him out of savouring the Moreton Bay bugs and pavlova (among other things) that defending champion Adam Scott had planned for the 30 Masters champions who did attend Tuesday night's dinner.

Not that the biggest names in golf are ordered to eat what Scott selected.

If the reigning champ's taste isn't to the taste of the other Masters winners, they can order off Augusta National's regular menu, which includes steaks, chicken and fish dishes.

No doubt that must have occurred when a then 20-year-old Woods ordered cheeseburgers, chicken sandwiches, french fries and milkshakes







There have been many battles, although they're rarely described as bitter ones, fought on a golf course.

Yet a 'war' over the Heritage golf course in Melbourne's Chirnside Park is actually been fought off the golf course.

Two of China's richest men, Sunny Sun and Wang Hua, are at loggerheads over property which includes Australia's only private Jack Nicklaus-designed signature golf course and a potential price tag totalling \$31.5m.

The proposed sale of the Heritage Estate comes after Sun's company Golden Heritage Golf was placed into receivership earlier this year.

On offer are shares in the Heritage Golf and Country Club, the St John golf course as well as the Tony Cashmore-designed Henley golf course, clubhouse and pro shop and also a health spa and resort.

And it seems this is not the first time the property has been in the hands of receivers.

Sun purchased the 176ha Heritage Estate in 2011 for \$15m from liquidators appointed by receivers to the Letten Schemes.

The Letten Schemes was a series of property investment funds established by Mark Letten that had end value of \$80m.

Wang later bought into the project with the view to gaining control of the entire property.

The business relationship between Wang and Sun soured last year after they were unable to reconcile the ownership of the estate.


